All of the Infant children took part in 'Memorable Experiences' in their classes as part of their half-termly learning themes, including visits to Whitepost Farm, and Mercia Marina for a boat ride! Learning themes have included 'Wriggle & Crawl' with mini-beast hunts, 'The Scented Garden' growing a variety of vegetables, 'Why are carrots Orange?' with a 'Wear Rainbow colours Day', and 'The Enchanted Woodland' making bug houses! Our school continues to be a hive of activity with lots of exciting opportunities for our boys and girls both inside and outside the classroom. The feeling of the sun's rays permeating our classrooms creates a real buzz and it is lovely to offer our pupils the chance to play the vast open field now that is it dry.

Young Person's Forest

Pupils from Class Endeavour have recently taken part in the launch of the 'Young Person's Forest,' an area in Shipley Country Park that has been acquired by the Woodland Trust.

The site, named 'Mead', was a former surface mine, owned by UK coal and covers an area of 162 hectares.

Our pupils took part in various environmental activities and planted the first of the 260,000 trees planned for the area.

As Shipley is a place our pupils are familiar with, we were keen to get involved with the development of the area, giving our children the chance to watch it flourish and evolve over their lifetime.

Councillor Kevin Buttery - Keeping you Updated

Proposals are being drawn-up by Derbyshire County Council for a Festival of Derbyshire to boost tourism, which is about bringing new investment and creating more jobs.

Tourism is a vital and growing industry for Derbyshire worth £2.15 billion to the local economy and supporting more than 29,000 jobs directly and many more indirectly.

Proposals are at an early stage and will need a small investment to develop ideas for the festival, that will involve working alongside the Derbyshire Culture, Heritage and Tourism Board and other partners that will hopefully bring significant rewards.

You only have to see what Yorkshire is doing to put itself on the world stage with the recent Tour De Yorkshire cycle race, to see the benefits. Yorkshire recently boasted a record breaking number of overseas visitors which is helping drive the county's economy and it, creating jobs and business growth.

A Festival of Derbyshire will be as much about tomorrow as it is about marking our past and how we can use our huge assets to create investment and jobs.

From 1st July, upgraded ticket machines on buses throughout the county will be able to identify invalid Gold Cards by reading the electronic chip on the card itself. These tend to be ones which have been reported lost or stolen, or cardholders have multiple cards and are not using their latest up-to-date one. Please check that you are using the latest issue, which is the card with the highest 13 digit number shown on the front of the card.

Gold Cards enable passengers to get free, off-peak travel on local buses throughout England. Off-peak travel is after 9.30am up to 11pm weekdays and any time at weekends and bank holidays. Gold Card is also a Derbyshire and Derby city library card and entitles the cardholder to get discounts at around 700 local shops and on other services.

The Council has just agreed a Derbyshire Climate and Carbon Reduction Manifesto, to address climate change. Global temperatures are projected to continue rising, bringing about changes in weather patterns and increased frequency and intensity of extreme weather. Local Councils do have a clear role to play in adapting to climate change by changing the way we do things, protecting against negative impacts and taking advantage of any opportunities. The manifesto is aimed at cutting greenhouse gas emissions, championing eco-homes, supporting renewable energy and energy efficiency. The promotion of low emission travel, introducing electric vehicles into the Council fleet and exploring opportunities for low carbon fuels for Heavy Goods Vehicles.

The UK currently uses in the region of 25% Nuclear Power, 30% Renewable, 5% solid fuels and 40% Gas. It is therefore likely that gas will be around for a long time, so we do need to look at how we manage the emissions from it. I was surprised to learn that food waste represents 3% of the UK's domestic greenhouse gas emissions, which is the same as those created by 7 million cars each year. We can all play our part in the way we protect the environment, in some cases by simply insulating our homes better and reducing our food waste.

Report from the May Parish Council meeting:

Together with residents, Members of the Parish Council are extremely concerned about parking on Highfield Rd — especially around the schools and the pedestrian crossing. The Police have been informed and additional patrols are to be made. Residents are reminded that it is illegal to park on the zig zag lines of the pedestrian crossing and the police are able to issue fines which would also incur penalty points on licence. This selfish parking is putting children's lives at risk.

The Parish Council has been informed that there will be no police presence at our annual Remembrance Day Parade and Service. This is obviously disappointing and causes a number of problems to the Council, especially as the Council does not have the powers to stop traffic. However, the Council will apply for road closures in the usual way and have asked Amber Valley Borough Council if they could supply additional signage for the road closures. Additional marshals will be used both on the parade and at the war memorial.

The Parish Council meeting due to be held on 10th June will commence at 6.30pm in order for training for Members to held after.

SAFER AMBER VALLEY NEWS

Dream holiday or short break? Book it safely, and don't become a victim of holiday fraud

Thousands of people in the UK become victims of holiday fraud every year - paying for non-existent accommodation, flights or entire holidays. They lose their holiday and their hard-earned money.

We've teamed up with Get Safe Online to bring you expert tips to help protect you when booking a holiday. Make sure you:

- thoroughly research private advertisements for accommodation, flights, cruises or pack age holidays, to check that they are authentic.
- check reviews on Trip Advisor, or similar sites.
- check that accommodation really exists by finding it on Google Maps and, if you can, call the owner/agent directly. If the number is not provided, email and request it.
- remember that paying by credit card means you have more chance of getting your money back, if something goes wrong.
- never transfer money in payment for accommodation or travel. If you do, and it's a fraud, your bank will not be obliged to refund your money.
- type in the correct website address if paying online, rather than following a link ensure the payment page is secure it should begin with 'https' and display a locked padlock.
- are wary of unusually cheap holidays or requests for high deposits.
- read terms and conditions before making any payment.
- keep the confirmations and payment receipts and check your statements for irregular entries.
- confirm that travel agents and tour operators are members of trade associations, such as ABTA or ATOL. You can do this on these bodies' websites.

If you think you've been a victim of holiday or any other fraud, report it immediately to Action Fraud online or tel: 0300 123 2040.

<u>Summer Holidays – Security advice</u>

Amber Valley Borough Council and Derbyshire Police advice on Summertime Crime:

- Make sure you don't leave windows and doors open, even if you go out for a short time.
- Always keep doors locked if out of view, for example if you are all in the back garden.
- Keep sheds and garage doors closed and locked, even for short periods.
- Don't leave valuables or keys on view.
- If you leave your property whilst on holiday, leave lights and a radio on timers to come on and off at similar times to your usual pattern. Get a trusted neighbour to keep an eye on your home, even open and close your curtains if you can.
- Remember to disable location services on your mobile phone and never post on social media your holiday plans.

ARTHUR MEDICAL CENTRE

Long-term Condition Reviews at Arthur Medical Centre (AMC)

The Department of Health tell us that there are aabout 15 million people in England who have a 'long-term condition'. Long term conditions (chronic diseases) are those for which there isn't a cure, but which can be managed effectively with lifestyle changes, medicine and other treatment. Well known examples of such conditions include diabetes, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), and dementia.

While the pot of NHS money *may* be growing, it isn't keeping pace with the demands on the system. Managing long term conditions is a central task of the NHS and what we do for you here. Caring for these needs requires a continued partnership with you as, put simply, helping you to help yourself can mean a lesser impact of that disease into the future. And yes, NHS chiefs say it costs less too. For me as a GP, its not necessarily about living longer or saving the cash but, much more about the quality of life; being able to ride a bike until I'm 95 or maintain that highly valued independence. Fortunately, many of these conditions don't show their teeth with symptoms early on but they often creep up and bite later. Optimisation of care to prevent bites out of quality of life is the most important thing we can do.

About 25% of you have at least one chronic long term condition. I hope by now you will be beginning to see why it matters. The team at AMC aim to help you to manage your condition through what are called **chronic disease reviews**. So, if you do have a long term condition it is very important that we have the opportunity to discuss it with you.

A chronic disease review is often in several parts and the order of these parts is important to make sure we have all the information we need at hand to make the right decisions together with you about your care. Depending on the condition, you may be **firstly** asked to have blood tests and physical checks done *before* you talk to a nurse, advanced nurse practitioner, pharmacist or doctor. Please therefore make sure you follow the advice of the team in terms of what is needed and when.

Once we have any measurements we need this will then prompt the **second** part of the review. This is the time where we can discuss results from stage one. We can also look at any challenges you face, sort out misunder-standings, encourage you to set realistic targets and hopefully congratulate you on your successes! While it is no secret that The Practice is set national targets to meet which do in part govern how it is funded, with the pragmatic approach here at AMC, it's much more about finding out *how you are getting on as an individual*.

Some conditions can't be managed without drugs. While much of the review won't be about medicines, a medication review is a key element for some. If used properly, medicines are generally safe and tolerated very well but it is essential that we check what you are taking, make sure you are taking it appropriately and ensure it is doing what it is supposed to be. If there aren't any problems we will also reset the clock on your repeat prescriptions so you can keep getting the medicine until your next review is due. Because it's about safety, if you don't have a timely medication review you may be refused or issued with a small supply of medication. We know for some of you who have managed your condition and medicines for years this can be frustrating but things do change so please help us to keep you safe.

AMC are currently looking at the whole chronic disease review process and in particular the way that we inform you about a review being due. As it stands, you may be sent a letter in the post, or informed by a letter attached to your prescription if it comes from Amber Pharmacy. We are exploring new ways to keep you informed like the web site and are very keen to hear ideas that you might have. We are also looking at innovative ways to conduct the second discussion part of the review especially if everything is stable. It may be that you do not need to physically attend surgery at all, liberating much needed time for appointments for other people to be seen.

Finally, I hope that you have found this to be an interesting read. Please watch the various AMC related spaces over the coming months for more updates and information. As always, any member of the team can guide you as to whether you have a long term condition and if a review is due. Thank you.

Time Swap



Swap time not money!

Information Sheet

What are Time Banks/Time Swaps?

Time Banks originated in the USA in the mid 1980's and Time Banking has been active in the UK since 1998 and there are now over 350 Time Banks around the UK. There are lots of great stories about the benefits of Time Banking as a way to bring communities together by getting help with odd jobs and lending a hand yourself. Currently in the UK, from Cornwall to Scotland, there are local Time Banks using times as a medium of exchange to link people together. Time Banks can help fill gaps for local people by them sharing skills, services, talents and life experiences with each other.

How will Time Swap work?

The idea is very simple, members 'deposit' their time in the bank by giving help and support to other members and then are able to 'withdraw' their time when they need something done themselves or alternatively they can donate their time to other members in the Time Swap scheme. Everybody's time is worth the same and for every hour an individual gives helping someone, they are entitled to one hour's credit in return. All this activity is recorded by a Time Broker who matches up the right task to the right person and also issues Time Swap statements so that members can keep a record of how many hours they have given and received.

Members will have an enormous range of skills and services that they can offer to their fellow members. Requests for help and support are received at the office and Time Swap members are contacted to enable time to be exchanged. Time Swap members will be able to offer assistance in many ways including: simple DIY; small Gardening tasks; Companionship; Computer Skills; Decorating; Ironing; Shopping; Errands; Form Filling; Knitting/Sewing/Crochet/Mending; Car Washing; Dog Walking to name but a few. The time Swap will be as good as its members want it to be. The Time Swap Initiative will be free to join and all new members will receive an hour of time to be deposited into their account. There is no 'catch' - you just have to be prepared to both receive and give time by helping others and allowing other people to help you!
