# **War Memorial Refurbishment**



The Parish Council originally began to consider the refurbishment of the war memorial over 5 years ago. Several applications were put to the War Memorial Trust, however, in May 2018 the WMT again put forward reasons why they could not give a grant and made further suggestions. It was at this point that Members of the Parish Council decided that the refurbishment should be funded from reserved funds held by the Council. These reserved funds were in the main monies that were held following the sale of a plot of land at Northfield. However, the Council took on the suggestions made by the WMT and employed an accredited architect to oversee the project. The architect for the project worked with the council to ensure that all of the WMT requirements were met and that also the ascetics were right for such am important monument to the village.

Eventually, the project was completed ahead of schedule and under budget. We know that many of the parishioners were interested to see that it was finished for Memorial Sunday. The final costs for the project will be approximately £31,000.

The wreath holders are still to be fixed and also the Winifred Wassell plaque is to be replaced so that it is keeping with the whole of the memorial.

A re-dedication of the memorial was held Tuesday 29<sup>th</sup> January by the (Acting) Bishop of Derby and parishioners were welcome to attend. Refreshments were served after in Kilburn Welfare.

# **Memorial Sunday**



As the world stopped on Sunday 11th November to remember all of those people who have fallen over the many battles, Kilburn turned out in their 100's to remember the centenary year. With the war memorial refurbishment finished in time. It was a fitting tribute to our fallen heroes where we could remember them. The laying of wreaths by Politicians, Parish Council and local groups as the Last Post played a silence was heard all around Kilburn for this touching tribute. With prayers led by Andrew and Martin from Horsley St Clements a large turnout then moved onto the Kilburn Baptist Church for a moment of prayer and remembrance. Small crosses with the names of the Kilburn fallen were laid by the children onto the monument and can now still be seen at the memorial. Silhouettes of the fallen were placed on seats within the Baptist chapel as a tribute to remember those who lost their lives for us all of those years ago. The finishing touches were drinks hosted by Graham and his team at the Baptist Church. Our thanks go out to Kilburn Scouts & Brownies and all who helped making the day's service a success.



This year also saw the return of the poppies around the village. All of the 70 poppies were installed to line the route of the parade and with the spares from the previous year they were installed on the bus route around Kilburn.


# Kilburn Parish Neighbourhood Watch

# Councillor Kevin Buttery - Keeping you Updated



Amber Valley Borough Council's Garden Waste Service will commence from Monday 25 February 2019

and finish on Friday 29 November 2019. The service will remain at last year's price of £40. New customers who wish to receive the service will need to purchase a bin, unless they already own one, which costs an extra £20, which will be delivered to your property. In the last 5 years residents have helped the Council collect over 21,000 tonnes of garden waste. The waste collected is turned into compost which is then re-used instead of being disposed of in a landfill site, which benefits the environment. Thank you for supporting this service. If you wish to subscribe to the Garden Waste Service, payment can be completed online, or by calling 01773 841440 or by making payment at the Ripley Town Centre Office.

Fly-tipping continues to blight communities and costs the Council tens of thousands of pounds to clean up. Even if the Council cannot prove who actually physically fly-tipped an item, they can prosecute for breach of Duty of Care under the **Environmental Protection Act.** What we are seeing at the moment is Fridge-Freezers being left outside houses, hoping the scrap dealer will come along and remove them. As they contain CFC gases, some dealers are cutting out the metal of interest, then disposing of the fridge freezer illegally. Please note that, as the householder, you remain fully responsible for the disposal of any waste and could be prosecuted if it ends up being flytipped. Also, fridge freezers can be disposed of, legally, at Loscoe Re-cycling Centre. Make sure you obtain a waste transfer note and receipt of payment when you ask someone to dispose of waste on your behalf, otherwise you could end up facing a hefty fine.

The Borough Council has recently added three new small sweepers to the fleet of cleaning machines patrolling around the Borough. They are fitted with tracker systems, which enables the council to monitor which areas have been swept. The sweeper crews work on a shift cycle that also allows them to operate 7 days a week. Please let me know if there any particular problem areas.

This year saw the Council extend free Christmas parking over a two-week period. This was free to everyone after 1pm, to encourage more visits to shops in our Town Centres, in support of local businesses. I am interested in your views as to whether the Council should continue with this, or revert back to a shorter period, free all day just for Amber Valley residents.

A big thank you to all those who took part in the Library consultation, with over Derbyshire 7,000 residents responding. New plans, which have now been agreed, will see 20 out of 45 Libraries being transferred to communities. No Libraries will close. A total of £724,000 has been allocated to

ensure smooth transition to community management, but the Council is still looking to have achieved £1.6m worth of savings by 2021.

Low temperatures and consistent rain does have a significant impact upon our roads. Pothole repair still remains a challenge for our Highways Department. Whilst the Council try to fix potholes within a couple of days, this can extend from anything between 5 and 28 days, dependent upon severity and workload. So far this year Council Staff have fixed over 66,000 potholes, compared with 25,000 last year. I am conscious we need to keep on top of things, so please use the Derbyshire County Council's website to report any road defects under the Transport Section as it makes the process more efficient www.derbyshire.gov.uk

I held a site meeting with Highways Officers in respect of the overall condition of Rowan Drive, so I am pleased they have quickly responded by resurfacing the entire length of road, instead of the previously planned patchwork type repairs.

### **Report from the January Parish Council meeting:**

At the January meeting we were informed that Rowan Drive was being resurfaced following repeated requests. However, the Parish Council have made a complaint about the quality of workmanship when potholes are being filled which necessitated further visits from the County Council

At the January meeting the Parish Council set a budget for 2019/20 of £85726 with a Precept of £53680.

Members are very concerned about the lack of policing in the area – it was especially concerning when there were no police in attendance at the Remembrance Day Parade and Service. Neither was there any communication that there would be no police in attendance. The Police Commissioner, Hardyal Dhindsa, will attend the Parish Council meeting on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> March 2019 (7pm in the Village Hall). YOU ARE WELCOME TO ATTEND TO PUT YOUR CONCERNS TO THE COMMISSIONER.

#### ARTHUR MEDICAL CENTRE

There has been a huge increase in the demands and workload placed on General Practice nationally and Arthur Medical Centre is also feeling this. A GP can often see up to 6 patients in practice in the time it takes to do a home visit, and an assessment is often more effective when undertaken at the practice than in a patient's home. Please can we remind you that we are limiting home visits to people who are truly in need of them.



Self-care refers to the actions we take to recognise, treat and manage our own health. It's about doing small, everyday things for you to keep healthy and happy.

Why? - Self-care is good for you and for the NHS. There are lots of benefits to self-care. We believe it's:

**Quicker -** No need to wait for a GP appointment. You can buy the medicines you need over the counter at your local pharmacy or supermarket and have them ready to use at home.

**Easier -** Many treatments can be bought without a need for a prescription at your local pharmacy or supermarket, often for much less than a prescription charge.

**Simple -** Advice and information about self-care is widely available online. You can also call into any pharmacy for advice on the best treatment for minor illness.

**Considerate -** Self-care helps relieve pressures on GP practices. A&E and could potentially save the NHS around £136m every year

#### How does this affect me?

We wanted to let you know about some changes the practice will be making as a result of new guidance promoting self-care introduced nationally in March this year. The guidance makes recommendations that GPs and other healthcare professionals should no longer routinely prescribe medicines which can be bought over the counter (OTC) for minor and self-limiting conditions. These conditions include hay fever, cough and colds, temperatures/fevers, indigestion and headaches. We will also be reviewing patient's repeat prescriptions in the New Year and will be removing items that can be bought OTC. If this affects you, you will receive a letter explaining the change.

### Why does the NHS want to reduce prescribing of these medicines?

The NHS has to make difficult choices about what it spends taxpayers' money on and how much value the taxpayer is getting for that money. By reducing the amount the NHS spends on treating these minor health conditions, the NHS can give priority to appointments and treatments for patients with more serious conditions such as cancer and mental health problems.

### Where can I go for advice?

We encourage you to visit the "self-care" section of www.nhsstaywellderbyshire.co.uk which has lots of information and advice on treating minor health problems with self-care.

We would also like to remind you of the valuable service your community pharmacist offers. They are trained professionals who are able to talk through your symptoms, offering advice and reassurance on how long these may last and what to do if these continue or get worse.

# A voice from Kilburn..

### Three Decades of Brainteasing Tradition

Kilburners are a brainy bunch. For over three decades, residents have turned out to flex their mental muscles and exercise the grey matter at the annual Kilburn Village Treasure Hunt. If you haven't been before, take a read below to find out some of what goes on. Maybe you'll be tempted to pick up a clipboard and join in? Oh, and don't forget the brolly; it may be summer but it's still Britain...

### **Early Treasure Hunts**

The annual Treasure Hunt is a familiar sight to villagers. Like a cuckoo signalling spring, the sight of families with clipboards puzzling over lampposts is confirmation that summer has started.

Our older readers might remember the first treasure hunts, started by the Kilburn Community Association in the 1980s. The goal back then was to get residents exploring the many footpaths around the village. In fact, older readers might remember routes going some way beyond Kilburn. Not just to neighbouring Horsley but up hill, down dale, and over fields— sometimes 80 or 90 clues stretching all the way to Holbrook. Unsurprisingly, given the length of the walk, some teams gave up and went home for a cuppa (or maybe just the nearest pub?)

The writers of the Treasure Hunt—originally Margaret Woolley and David Harris—tweaked things to keep the event fun. Shorter routes with fewer clues were the order of the day, and the event was scheduled to fit both the school holidays and the Scout and Guide groups. Margaret became the sole writer and mastermind of the Treasure Hunt until she sadly passed away 9 years ago. The mantle was passed to two friends of Margaret—Dee John and Andrea Sparham—who have been the writers ever since.

### The Treasure Hunt Today

And so now, each summer, on the last Friday before the summer holidays the treasure hunters assemble. Between 130 and 180 people of all ages form teams from lone wolves up to the whole family (including Great Aunt Sheila). You might see them pointing at a gnome or studying the bus timetables with forensic precision. Participants find answers to a series of riddle-based clues, hidden in gardens and in streets. The team with the most correct answers are the winners, announced later in the Kilburn News. You will hear a few groans as they realise it was the *other* gnome they wanted, after the answers are revealed at the end.

Don't be worried if you think it's not for the smaller children in the family, younger treasure hunters are kept involved with their children's challenge – spotting the well-hidden owls, frogs, and turtles around the route. Of course, all this brainstorming works up both an appetite and a thirst and intrepid explorers eventually find their way back to the Hunters Arms. Landlord and landlady Mark and Paula Showers provide a BBQ as well as sweets and drinks for the children.

The Treasure Hunt isn't just about exploring the village and winning by a half point—it's a charity event, too. Proceeds from the raffle, BBQ, and clues all go toward local causes. Recently, it has supported the Gemma Brown appeal. Gemma, a Kilburn resident and childminder, sadly lost her battle with cancer in 2017. Money raised has been spent on many local causes for children in Kilburn and neighbouring villages. It seems a fitting tribute to Gemma to raise money exploring the village and playground she herself knew so well.
